

FERAL HOGS **DAMAGE**OUR LAND & WATERSHED

Feral hogs are invasive, destructive, and rapidly multiplying. An estimated **8,283 feral** hogs roam the Middle Yegua Creek Watershed, and their impact is severe





Riparian Destruction

Feral hogs tear up streambanks and creekside vegetation by rooting, wallowing, and trampling delicate habitats. This leads to erosion, loss of wildlife habitat, poor water retention during dry periods, and ncreased sediment in our creeks and rivers.

Water Contamination

Feral hog feces often wash into streams, ponds, and tanks carrying E. coli, parasites, and other harmful bacteria. This pollution threatens the health of our wildlife, livestock, and even people.

What You Can Do

- Report hog sightings to your local officials
- Work with neighbors to monitor land for activity
- Safely trap or harvest hogs (lawfully)
- Spread awareness. These aren't just a nuisance; they're a public health and environmental issue
